

#### OPENING OF THE COLONIAL LEGISLATURE.

Sir F. Head opened the Colonial Assembly of Upper Canada on the 28th December, and addressed the Legislative Council and the House of Assembly at great length. His Excellency commenced by stating that he deemed it necessary to convene the Legislature earlier than customary, for the purpose of communicating the present state of the Province. He then alludes to the loss sustained in the demise of his late Majesty, and to the accession of Queen Victoria, "whose youth, education, virtues, and sex, endearing her to her subjects, claim their loyal protection and support."

Sir Francis then states that he had been suddenly called on to suppress a rebellion in the Province, and adverts to its origin and progress. He had been sent to correct the grievances that existed, and had appealed to the sense of the people through their Representatives, who had unequivocally supported him. A few individuals, disappointed at the result, had declared that the people of Upper Canada had been mistaken in their verdict, and asserted that it had been obtained by improper means. ## OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.—THE QUEEN'S SPEECH.

(From the Evening Mail of last night.)

The third session of the first parliament of Queen Victoria was opened yesterday, with the accustomed ceremonies by her most gracious Majesty in person.

The morning was cloudy; still considerable crowds assembled along the line of road which the royal procession took on its way from the Palace to the royal entrance to the House of Lords, and about twelve the day clearing up had the effect of drawing out increased numbers. The ground on either side was kept by a strong detachment of the Guards and a large body of police, under the immediate superintendence of the two commissioners, Mr. Mayne and Colonel Rowan. The windows and balconies along Whitehall and Parliament-street were filled with ladies.

Soon after half-past one the royal procession left Buckingham Palace in state, escorted by a body of the Guards in their full-dress uniforms. Her Majesty looked well, and occasionally acknowledged the gratulations with which she was received on her way to the house. **TREATY OF COMMERCE AND NAVIGATION  
BETWEEN HER MAJESTY AND THE EMPEROR  
OF ALL THE RUSSIAS,**

SIGNED AT ST. PETERSBURGH, JANUARY 11, 1843.  
[Ratifications exchanged at London, January 31, 1843.]

In the name of the Most Holy and Indivisible Trinity.  
Her Majesty the Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and his Majesty the Emperor of all the Russias, being desirous of extending, increasing, and consolidating the commercial relations between their respective dominions and possessions, and of thereby procuring all possible facilities and encouragements for those of their subjects who partake in those relations; and being persuaded that nothing can more contribute to the accomplishment of their mutual wishes in this respect, than the reciprocal abolition of the differential and countervailing duties which are at present exacted and levied on the vessels or produce of either of the two states in the ports of the other, have named as their plenipotentiaries for the conclusion of a treaty to this effect, that is to say:—

The Queen held a Court yesterday afternoon at Buckingham Palace for the reception on the throne of addresses from both Houses of Parliament.

Soon after two o'clock, the Lord Chancellor arrived at the Palace, attended by Mr. J. W. Birch, Clerk Assistant of Parliament; Sir Augustus Clifford, Bart., Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod; and the Sergeant at Arms; and accompanied by the Marquis Camden and Lord Glenlyon, the mover and seconder of the address in the House of Lords; and also by the following peers:—The Duke of St. Alban's, the Earl Nelson, the Earl of Ellenborough, Earl of Dalhousie, Earl of Hardwicke, Viscount Hawarden, Lord Redesdale, and Lord Colchester.

The interchange of sympathy between our mourning QUEEN and the bereaved widows of the Hartley catastrophe has done much to strengthen the bond of loyal devotion and attachment to the Crown, which every year of the present reign has tended to secure. We have already noticed her Majesty's touching telegrams of inquiry and condolence with the widows and orphans of the miners; and the donation of £200, which was among the first contributions to that fund of £20,000 now fully realized, for the sustenance of the bereaved families. We are glad to observe that, following her Majesty's example, the Prince of WALES has forwarded a donation of £100 for the relief of the sufferers.


